Goal: ↑ focal shorebird pops. 10-15% by 2020

- Participation:>60 agencies, NGOs, universities




Shorebird Business Strategy – Becomes the Shorebird Initiative

CMS COP 11: Time for Action!

CMS COP11 was held in Ouito, Ecuador from 4 - 9 November 2014

Highlights:

- Listing on the CMS Appendices of 32 migratory species under threat, including Semipalmated Sandpiper Calidris pusilla.
- Adoption of Strategic Plan for Migratory Species 2015-2023
- Adoption of Global Programme of Work on Migratory Birds (POW) (2015-2023), which included the Americas Flyways Framework
- Guidelines to prevent the risk of poisoning of migratory birds;
- Resolution to prevent the illegal killing, taking and trade of migratory birds;
- Review of the deployment of renewable energy technology and its impacts on migratory species and guidelines on how to avoid or mitigate those impacts;

Americas Flyways Framework

Origin:

- Initial document developed during a CMS/WHMSI Americas Flyways experts meeting (Jamaica, March 2014), building upon:
 - WHMSI Action Plan for Integrated Migratory Bird Conservation in the Americas
 - Review of migratory bird instruments and initiatives in the Americas
- 16 Actions proposed under 5 strategic goals

Evolution:

- Draft framework developed by WHMSI task force (Washington D.C., April 2014) and shared with "Friends of WHMSI" for review
- Framework combines elements of the draft CMS Migratory Bird PoW with the WHMSI Action Plan













Americas Flyways Framework

Proposed Coordination:

■ Proposes establishment of a voluntary, collaborative partnership with formal invitation to CMS and its signatories, the governments of the Western Hemisphere, and national and international non-profit organizations and other leading stakeholders to join this partnership




